Background Knowledge for Teachers

King Solomon was the third king of Israel and the wisest man who ever lived. He was the author of Ecclesiastes and Song of Solomon, as well as most of Proverbs and some of Psalms. According to the Bible, Solomon "spoke three thousand proverbs: and his songs were one thousand and five" (1 Kgs 4:32).

Early in Solomon's life, he recognized his need for wisdom to rule his kingdom, but by the time Solomon asked for wisdom, he had already started a habit that would affect his personal life—he sealed a pact with Egypt by marrying Pharaoh's daughter. She would be the first of hundreds of wives married for similar reasons. His actions remind us how easy it is for us to know what is the right thing to do and yet not do it.

As Solomon went through life pursuing the meaning of life, the Book of Ecclesiastes records his last reflections after he had come full circle. The meaning of life is to know God, fear Him, and obey His commandments. That is true wisdom.



Reaching Out to Your Students

Starting at E2, students may not be interested in asking for wisdom as Solomon did. However, we should encourage them not to crave for material things, which only bring immediate pleasure and fun. But rather, they should be interested in asking God for wisdom. While Solomon asked only for wisdom, he received everything else, too. If our students take the time to figure out why Solomon wanted wisdom and see how it helped him in every practical situation, they will also see how it can relate to their own lives.



Opener

5 Minutes

If you were given a wish, and you could ask for absolutely anything you wanted and it would be granted to you, what would you ask for? [Ask students to share their responses.]

In our lesson today, we will learn about what King Solomon asked for. Solomon asked God for something quite unusual, but it was by far more important than riches, computer games, good grades, beauty, or power. This request affected the way he lived his life and how he governed his kingdom.

Bible Discovery & Spiritual Teaching

30-35 Minutes

A. Get the Scoop - Live from Jerusalem

MA: (Speaking to the camera)

Hello, I'm Michael Angelo and I'm reporting for CGN (Christian Good News). Today, I'm in the royal palace in Jerusalem where I will be talking to King Solomon. You may already have heard about King Solomon's great wisdom and understanding, but what you may not know is how it all started. I'm here to find out more.

(MA turns to King Solomon)

MA: King Solomon, it's an honor to meet you. Everyone near and far has heard so much about you and your astounding wisdom.

KS: I didn't start out this way (chuckles). I was 30 years old when I became king. As you know, my father King David was a God-loving and upright king, and he did a good job governing this nation. I had humongous shoes to fill.

MA: But now you are known to be the wisest and most prosperous king of the East. Kings, queens, and great men from different lands all come to listen to your wisdom. You have written many proverbs and songs, and you have an amazing knowledge about the animals, birds, snakes, fish, and trees. Where did you get this vast wisdom?

KS: At the time, I was a new king, and I had gone to offer sacrifices to God at Gibeon.

MA: Record has it that you offered one thousand burnt offerings. That's an incredible amount! After that, you had an extraordinary experience. Can you tell us about that?

KS: That night, God appeared to me and told me to ask Him for anything that I wanted and He would give it to me.

MA: Now out of a zillion things you could have asked for, what did you end up asking for?

KS: I asked for wisdom.

MA: That's an unusual request. Why did you not ask for longevity, great wealth, or military power? These are important to a king, too.

KS: Oh, you are right, and everyone wants these things. But wisdom is what I needed most. You know, running a country is a great honor, but it's a huge responsibility, too. On top of that, this great nation belongs to God. I was young and knew little about leading God's people.

MA: So, how does wisdom help you govern God's people?

KS: Wisdom enables me to make wise judgments, to choose correctly. It also helps me know the difference between right and wrong.

MA: Now, do you think that what you asked for pleased God?

KS: Oh, yes! God was pleased that I didn't ask for long life, riches, or the defeat of my enemies. As a result, God gave me a mind wiser than anyone has ever had or will have.

MA: Looking around your kingdom, there are some splendorous buildings that you have built. There's the temple of God, the royal palace, the wall of Jerusalem and many other cities. We've also heard that your throne is made of pure gold and that there is no other throne like it in all the world. When you eat and dine, you do so out of cups and plates made of solid gold. Your stables are full of horses and chariots, and ships come in from foreign lands laden with gold, silver, and treasures. All this shows that not only are you wiser than all the kings of the earth, but you are the richest king, too.

KS: Yes, God gave me what I asked for, which was wisdom. But what you see are the things that I didn't ask for, which are riches, honor, and longevity. God gave those to me, too.

MA: King Solomon, is there any advice that you can give to our viewers?

KS: God said to me that as long as I obey His commandments and laws, He would continue to protect and bless my kingdom. For our viewers, let me just say this: fear God, obey His commandments, and you will lead a very happy life.

MA: King Solomon, it has been an honor and a pleasure talking to you. Thank you for your time. Once again, this is Michael Angelo from Jerusalem, reporting for CGN.

Discussion Questions

- **1. Why did Solomon want wisdom more than anything else?** Solomon recognized that he would require God's wisdom to enable his kingdom to be strong and blessed by God.
- **2. Why did Solomon's request please the Lord?** Solomon's focus was on being the kind of king that could lead God's people; he did not focus on being rich or powerful. His focus was God-centered and not self-centered.
- 3. Have you ever been in a situation where you didn't know what to do and needed wisdom? [Ask students to share.]

FOR TEACHERS

Hand out the Bible Discovery worksheet and ask students to complete it as you go through the next section.

B. More about Wisdom

Out of all the things Solomon could have asked for, he asked for wisdom. Let's dig deeper into the Bible to find out more about wisdom and its importance in our lives.

1. What is wisdom?

Today, people commonly believe that if you are smart, have a lot of knowledge, get good grades, and are talented, then you are someone with wisdom.

The Book of James 3:15-18 tells us there are two kinds of wisdom: worldly wisdom and God's wisdom. Worldly wisdom may enable someone to be smart and accomplished in the world, but such wisdom does not enable a person to know God or to live a life pleasing to Him. Worldly wisdom comes from the devil and brings with it selfishness, envy, disorder, and every other evil practice.

On the other hand, true wisdom comes from heaven. It enables us to know God and His word. True wisdom means knowing God's will and obeying it. It means living a life pleasing to Him. It's knowing right and wrong and making correct choices. A person who has God's wisdom will be pure, peaceable, gentle, willing to yield, merciful, bear good fruits, and so on.

2. How can I gain wisdom?

FOR TEACHERS

Ask students to read the verses on their own and fill in the blanks on the worksheet. Go over the answers as a class when they have all finished this section. The answers are listed in order below.

a. From Asking God

[Read James 1:5.] God is the source of wisdom. The same wisdom that God gave King Solomon is available to us if we ask Him.

b. From the Word of God

[Read Psalms 119:97-100.] God's word makes us wise. Through reading, meditating upon, and memorizing God's word, we can be wiser than our enemies, wiser than our teachers, and even wiser than the aged.

c. From Fearing God

[Read Proverbs 9:10.] When we fear God and follow God's commandments, we will gain wisdom.

d. From Receiving Instruction

[Read Proverbs 9:9.] It is often hard to listen to someone who corrects us or tells us something "for our own good." But when we humble ourselves and listen to the instructions of our parents and our teachers, we will become wiser.

e. From Nature around Us

[Read Proverbs 3:19.] When we look at the animals, birds, fish, trees, and plants around us, we will discover that it is a very wise and loving God who made everything. The more we learn about God's creation, the wiser we will be.

3. What do the wise do?

FOR TEACHERS

Ask students to read the passage and fill in the chart. After all the students have finished the chart, ask some volunteers to share their answers.

Read Ephesians 5:15-20. This passage talks about some of the behaviors of the wise and foolish. List down these behaviors in the chart below.

The Wise

Walk carefully
Make good use of time
Understand God's will
Are filled with God's Spirit
Sing hymns and songs to God
Give thanks always to God

The Foolish

Walk as fools
Do not understand God's will
Are drunk with wine

4. What are the benefits of having wisdom?

FOR TEACHERS

Ask students to read the verses, and then fill in the blanks.

a. Prov 3:16; 4:8-9
 We will have long life, riches, honor, and glory.

b. Prov 3:23

Wisdom will keep us from <u>harm</u> and <u>evil</u>. We will be able to discern what is right and wrong and not be led astray.

c. Prov 8:35; 2 Tim 3:15 We will receive eternal life.

The Holy Bible

The Holy Bible is the source of wisdom. It is inspired by God, and through reading, meditating upon, and memorizing the word of God, we will gain wisdom to lead our lives according to God's will, to receive salvation, and to be equipped for every good work (2 Tim 3:15).



Check for Understanding

5 Minutes

- 1. Why did Solomon ask for wisdom? He asked for wisdom so he could lead God's people according to God's will.

- **4. What are some of the ways we can gain wisdom?** We can ask God for wisdom, fear God, read the Bible, listen to instruction, and learn from nature.
- **5. Why did Solomon's request please God?** Solomon did not ask for things for himself. His focus was on God and helping His people.
- **6. Name some examples that show how God answered Solomon's prayer.** King Solomon became the wisest and most prosperous king of the East. Kings, queens, and great men from different lands came to listen to his wisdom. He wrote many proverbs and songs and had great knowledge about the animals, birds, snakes, fish, and trees. He built many marvelous buildings and properly ruled his kingdom.
- **7.** What are some of the behaviors of a wise person? A wise person will walk and act carefully, make good use of each opportunity, know God's will, be filled with God's Spirit, sing songs to God, and give thanks to God.
- **8.** Do you think wisdom is important to your life? Why? Answers may vary. Possible answer: Yes, because wisdom will help us make decisions that are pleasing to God.



Life Application

10 Minutes

Living Wisely

Sometimes, there are some people who are very knowledgeable and know a lot of facts and information, but they don't know God nor fear Him. These can also be people who know the right choice to make, but don't make it, and thus make bad choices as a result. To God, such people are without true wisdom. In fact, the Bible calls such people foolish.

On the other hand, there are people who may not be very smart or accomplished in the world, but they know God, fear him, and follow His ways. In God's eyes, these are the people with true wisdom.

[Make copies of the statements and scenarios provided on the Life Application Worksheet. Make one copy of per two students. Cut each set of statements and scenarios and put it in a plastic bag. Have students work in pairs. Give each pair a set of statements and scenarios. Have students read each scenario and match it with the corresponding statement. After the students have finished matching, discuss the answers with the students. The answers are in parentheses below.]

Activity

Scattergories

10-15 Minutes

Materials

- Blank paper
- List of categories
- Plastic bag or container

- Pencils
- Set of alphabet letters, excluding W, X, Y, and Z
- Timer

Preparations

- 1. Write each letter of the alphabet, leaving out W, X, Y, and Z, on a small piece of paper, and place the letters into a plastic bag or container.
- 2. Post the categories on the board. A list of categories has been provided below, but it may be modified as needed.
 - A type of food
 - An animal
 - A country
 - Things in the church
 - A Bible book
 - A five-letter word

- Name of a person in the Bible
- A place in the Bible
- A color
- Things in a forest
- Things in the ocean

3. Set a timer for thirty seconds.

Instructions

- 1. Pass out a blank sheet of paper to each student.
- 2. Explain to students that they have thirty seconds to write down words that start with the key letter and fit in the category. For example, if the key letter is P and the category is "country," answers may include Pakistan, Portugal, Poland, and so on.
- 3. Pick a letter from the bag or container, start the timer, and have students think of an answer starting with the key letter for all the categories.
- a. An example for "B": Banana, Barnabas, Baboon, Bethlehem, Brazil, Blue, Bible, Bears, [No Bible book starts with "B"], Barracuda, Break
- 4. After all the categories are answered, have students read out their complete list, one student at a time.
- 5. As each student reads out answers, other students may raise their hands if they have also written down that answer (i.e., two students have the same answer). That answer must then be disqualified and crossed out. After the student has finished reading the list, the student circles the answers that have not been used by anyone else and adds up the number of circled answers for that round.
- 6. Give each student the chance to read their list aloud, even if they're the last student to read.
- 7. Repeat the process with other letters for a set number of rounds. The student with the most number of points after all the rounds wins. After this, you may want to start a new game by posting a new category list.

Note: There are cases in which a word does not exist for a category, such as "B" for Bible book. In that case, the teacher can choose to award students who recognize that it doesn't exist, or choose not to score that category at all.
