A. The Israelites Complain to God

- 1. The reasons for their complaints
 - a. Negative influences: The "intense craving" of the mixed multitude impacted the people of Israel negatively and to devastating effect. We need to be mindful of our attitudes and alert to negativity from others.
 - b. They yielded to their desires: They allowed their desires to control them entirely, so much so that they forgot about what God had already given them.
 - c. Their nostalgia blinded them: They desired food that came with bondage and suffering, conveniently forgetting how they had cried out to God while in Egypt. At the same time, they rejected the miraculous providence of manna that came with God's freedom.
- 2. The consequences of their complaints: The level of complaint and rebellion against God was incredibly severe, and those who were guilty suffered terrible consequences. These events remind us that when we complain against God, we are not only showing a lack of gratitude, but are also despising God.

B. The Israelites Rebel Against the Lord

- 1. The ten spies' report: The spies recalled only the dangers that they saw and forgot how bountiful and fruitful the land was. More importantly, they forgot God's power.
- 2. Joshua and Caleb's report: Caleb's confidence lay in his belief in God's power. He and Joshua also understood that to reject this gift from God was to commit a sin worthy of punishment, showing their clear understanding of God's just and merciful power.

C. Moses' Prayer of Intercession

- 1. Moses appeals on behalf of God's glory (vv. 13–16): Moses' primary concern was not himself nor the Israelites, but God's glory.
- 2. Moses appeals to God's mercy (vv. 17–19): Moses humbly asked the Lord to show His great power not through punishment, but through His longsuffering and forgiveness.
