VICTORY AT JERICHO

"For the weapons of our warfare are not carnal but mighty in God for pulling down strongholds, casting down arguments and every high thing that exalts itself against the knowledge of God, bringing every thought into captivity to the obedience of Christ[.]" (2 Corinthians 10:4–5)

Objectives

A. Jericho

Jericho was a significant city in its time, and it may have been ideal to live in by worldly standards. However, the Bible tells us that Canaan was spiritually lost. Their sins were so great that the land itself was defiled. So, as God judged Sodom and Gomorrah, it was now time to cast His judgment on Jericho.

B. The Commander of the Army of the Lord

God promised to send an Angel to clear the way for the Israelites. Victory was already promised to them before they even entered Canaan! This was the power of the Commander of the Lord's army.

- 1. *Joshua's reaction:* Joshua showed three key aspects of our servitude: God is our Commander; holiness is key; and we need a humble and obedient heart.
- 2. God's promise and reassurance: Despite Jericho's military strength, it was already set to fall, and its people's defeat already ordained by God.

C. Marching Around Jericho

God's instructions may have felt foolish, confusing, or even embarrassing, but the Israelites' obedience to God's command was crucial to their victory.

- 1. The Israelites acted with faith: The Israelites endured the silent march for seven days, and as a result, "[by] faith, the walls of Jericho fell down" (Heb 11:30).
- 2. The Israelites acted with persistent obedience: If the Israelites had given up on the sixth day, they would not have witnessed the destruction of the city. It is important to obey without cutting corners, and to obey Him consistently, each day.

D. The Destruction of Jericho

- Victory from God: God has repeatedly told His people that obedience to Him will bring forth blessings. A clear example can be seen in God's faithful preservation of Rahab and her family.
- 2. Acknowledging God's victory: Jericho was the very first city that God conquered for the Israelites. But there was a valuable lesson for them to learn: the firstfruits must go to God. This is an act of acknowledgment that all things come from God.
